Personal experience with his own hearing loss is what inspired Dr. Hopkins Williams to pursue a career in audiology. Though he was born with normal hearing, Dr. Hopkins Williams began to lose his hearing when he was in grade school.

Early on, he wore hearing aids, but his hearing continued to decline. "My doctors were never able to figure out what caused my hearing loss, but I received a cochlear implant when I was 13 years old," Dr. Hopkins Williams explains."I hear very well with my implant. My hearing sensitivity and speech reception are essentially normal."

Dr. Hopkins Williams says his experience with the challenges of hearing loss have made him who he is, and fueled his career choice as an audiologist.

"I can definitely relate to my patients," he says." I know what it's like to withdraw from social situations because you can't hear. I want to encourage my patients to advocate for themselves." Continued on page 3



Audiologists Make Mission Trip to Guatemala

recently traveled to Guatemala as part of a medical mission trip with
Rotary International and Woodland Public Charity in mid-August.

The audiologists worked in a community health center near Lake Atitlan, assisting with establishing audiology services for the health center's patients.

"Our first trip consisted of building a hearing screening program and training some of the staff nurses how to screen for hearing loss," Dr. Jacobson explains. "Our participation is vital in order to bring audiological services to Guatemala. There are few resources there, but we will help build a long-term, self-supporting clinic that serves the community, even after we have left the country." The audiologists' goal is to train the clinic's staff and support them with periodic mission trips.

When Lucy Crabtree began to lose her hearing, she was only 4 years old. "Honestly, it was probably much more traumatic for my parents than it was for me," she admits. "My mom says I complained of having a 'soft ear' and a 'loud ear.'"

ver the years, Lucy saw a number of health care professionals. Though no one ever figured out the cause of her hearing loss, one was instrumental in helping her overcome her challenges— Jim Wise, Ph.D., FAAA, President Emeritus of Associated Audiologists.

"Our families were actually neighbors and friends even before I lost my hearing," Lucy says. "Dr. Wise guided us through the diagnostic testing process and he also was a valuable resource of emotional support, expressing genuine concern and care and empathizing with the dramatic change my parents and I were experiencing."

He also offered Lucy's family hope. "Dr. Wise's support was refreshing and encouraging in the face of less helpful advice from other specialists," Lucy says. "One doctor even told my parents that I wouldn't make it past the third grade!" Fast forward to today, and it's easy to see that Lucy not only proved that doctor wrong, but she hasn't let her hearing loss keep her from living life to its fullest."I graduated college cum laude, and now I am an editor with a Kansas City publishing company," she says.

Though Lucy is profoundly deaf without her hearing aids, Dr. Wise always has made sure she has the most reliable and up-to-date technology available. "Dr. Steele also has been exceedingly kind and supportive in much the same way, as has Dr. Nissen."

Lucy now wears two Phonak Nadia hearing aids. "My hearing aids are instrumental in helping me communicate with others. Studies show that lipreading alone would only give me about 30 percent of the information from a conversation," she says. "Adding hearing aids to the mix makes the world much more accessible to me, from carrying on conversations with

co-workers, to spending time with friends. And, music has always had a special place in my heart. If I didn't have my hearing aids, I never would have been exposed to Les Miserables, and what a tragedy that would be!"

side from being a patient at Associated Audiologists, Lucy says one of the best things she ever did for herself is to attend a meeting of the Kansas City chapter of the Hearing Loss Association of America (HLAAKC).

"Dr. Wise used to encourage me to attend meetings for the organization's predecessor, Self-Help for the Hard of Hearing," Lucy admits. "I always resisted because I was a high school and college student. I had visions of being the youngest person there, plus I was in denial for a long time that my hearing loss was something that needed a support group."

Then, about four years ago Lucy went to a meeting at a friend's urging, and has been involved ever since. HLAA's mission is to provide support, education, information and advocacy for people with hearing loss and their families. Events are aimed at educating and sharing information about things like cochlear implants, captioning and mental health for people who are deaf or hard of hearing.

"The goal of our social events is to provide a comfortable space to get together and just be with other people who get what it's like to live with hearing loss," Lucy says. "We also work on advocacy projects in Kansas City, particularly with regard to captioning."

Lucy is passionate about the group and wants to spread the word about HLAA to others with hearing loss."It's easy for people with hearing loss to become isolated and withdrawn," Lucy says."I want them to know there is a group out there for them.

"Being hard of hearing is a lonely place to be—you're not hearing the way the rest of your friends and family are, but neither are you culturally deaf," Lucy describes."Being hard of hearing feels like a bit of a



Get More Life from Your Hearing Aid Batteries

Hearing aids have made significant advances in recent years, but many of those advances require more power, and more powerful hearing aid batteries.

The professional line of batteries carried by Associated Audiologists are mercury-free and can power the newest hearing instruments, compared with over-the-counter batteries you might purchase in drugstore chains, at shopping clubs or online.

These professional batteries work best with the digital technology and wireless connectivity features found in highperforming hearing aids. This means that although less expensive batteries are available, you may end up spending more to power your hearing aids for an equal amount of time. In addition, less expensive batteries can negatively affect the performance of your hearing aids. Be sure to talk with your audiologist about which batteries work best with your hearing aids.



GET MORE LIFE FROM YOUR BATTERIES

- Before putting your batteries in your hearing aid, remove the sticker and expose them to the air for at least 60 seconds. This charges the battery and can help you get 25 to 30 percent longer life from your batteries.
- Turn your hearing aids off at night, and when not in use. Opening the battery door completely may also help extend battery life and allow contacts to stay dry.
- Batteries frequently have a longer shelf life when stored at room temperature. Don't keep them in the refrigerator and keep them out of direct sunlight or heat.
- An inexpensive battery tester is a good way to check your hearing aid battery's life.
- Always keep spare batteries with you.
