# "Don't Wait to Get Help with Your Hearing!"

It was Thanksgiving 2016 when Randi Cole first experienced hearing loss. Just 41 years old at the time, she'd had a bad cold, and chalked up the fact that she couldn't hear out of her left ear to a nasty virus.

went to my doctor and he started me on an antibiotic, but that didn't help," she said. Even after being referred to a subspecialist who treated her with steroid injections, her hearing loss continued.

"The hearing test showed my hearing loss was pretty severe in my left ear, but I thought I could get by without a hearing aid," she said.

And Randi did get by, continuing her career as a trainer in the crop insurance industry, and as a wife and a stepmom to two teenage daughters. She even competed in and won the 2019 Mrs. Kansas United States pageant.

"I had never competed in a pageant before, but it was a bet from my husband, and I decided to try it," Randi said. "When I won, I decided I would make hearing loss my platform, working with the Hearing Aid Project through Hearing Charities of America so that I could help others who couldn't afford hearing aids."

Ironically, though Randi worked hard to shine a spotlight on this important cause, the one thing she didn't do was get a hearing aid for herself.

"I'm kind of stubborn," Randi admitted."My hearing loss was affecting me professionally and in my personal relationships with my husband and stepdaughters. I started withdrawing from social gatherings, declining invitations I normally would have accepted because of the background noise. I did a lot of smiling and nodding, but I didn't really understand what people were saying."

#### **Dizziness Motivates Action**

Unrelated to Randi's hearing loss, in April 2020, in the midst of the pandemic, she began experiencing extreme bouts of dizziness.

"I remember in one instance I was standing in our living room with my family and I had to grab onto the couch to steady myself," she said."I felt like I was on one of those tilt-a-whirl rides at a carnival. I called my doctor and he referred me to Associated Audiologists."

Danielle Dorner, Au.D., dizziness and balance specialist, performed a comprehensive battery of tests using state-ofthe-art equipment to evaluate Randi's equilibrium system.

She diagnosed Randi with benign paroxysmal positional vertigo, or BPPV. The most common cause of vertigo, BPPV is related to the microscopic calcium carbonate particles commonly found in the inner ear. These particles can become displaced and move into one of the ear's semicircular canals where they do not belong. Most people with BPPV experience brief, intense episodes of vertigo that happen when they change positions.

During treatment, Dr. Dorner performed a noninvasive repositioning procedure to clear the particles out of the ear's semi-circular canal and place them back into the part of the inner ear where they belong.

### Does COVID-19 Affect Hearing?

the American Journal of Otolaryngology, have documented evidence that even those with no symptoms may experience damage to the outer ear hair cells, which could impact hearing.

After just two treatments, Randi's BPPV was completely resolved. With that problem taken care of, Dr. Dorner suggested she might talk with Dana Jacobson, Au.D., about her hearing loss and possible treatment options.

Randi agreed. Dr. Jacobson confirmed she has a severe hearing loss in her left ear, and recommended a Widex Evoke 440 hearing aid to improve her hearing.

#### **Don't Wait!**

"I was still reluctant to wear a hearing aid, but my husband reminded me that I had done a lot to encourage others to get help with their hearing loss, and that I needed to do this for myself. He was right," Randi said.

After Dr. Jacobson fit Randi with her new hearing aid, she couldn't believe all she had been missing."I am a nature lover and a bird watcher. I could hear the birds singing again, and on walks, I could even hear the sound of my footsteps. I had forgotten what that was like," she said.

Today, Randi isn't struggling to hear conversations at home or at work any longer.

"I've had my new hearing aid for several months now," Randi said."It matches my hair color and is almost invisible. I show it off every chance I get! It's been a Godsend. I can't believe I waited so long to get help!"

This technology can be especially beneficial to new hearing aid users or those with mild to moderate hearing loss.

## Here are Some Tips to Help When Wearing a Mask AND Hearing Aids

uring the COVID-19 pandemic, wearing a face mask or other cloth face covering has become a requirement in our clinic for both our staff and our patients. Based on current evidence and recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control, it's the best way to reduce the transmission of this virus.

But, wearing a face mask when communicating with someone who has hearing loss can be a challenge in a couple of ways. Probably the most obvious is that the mask covers the mouth, making it difficult for the individual with hearing loss to receive visual cues from the wearer.

These speech reading cues, like lip movements, provide someone with hearing loss with important information when trying to interpret what the other person is saying. In fact, research has shown that those with hearing loss have significant improvement in accuracy of interpreting the spoken word when visual cues are present. Visual cues also may improve hearing in noise.

Face masks also can reduce or muffle the sound from the wearer. Researchers found that a simple face mask can reduce volume from 3 to 4 dB, and an N95 mask can decrease the high frequencies by 12 decibels. A surgical mask also can reduce sound by 12 dB. As a frame of reference, a whisper registers about 20 dB.

Mask usage reduces the intensity of the speaker's voice. Someone with normal hearing could easily experience about a 30% decrease in audibility when listening to someone who is wearing a properly fitted N95 mask. Add background noise and the lack of visual cues, and it becomes obvious that masking can present some unique challenges for those with hearing loss.

Further confounding the problem is that most conversation takes place at about a 3-foot distance. Social distancing recommendations advise keeping at least 6 feet from others. Though this is necessary to help reduce the spread of the virus, doubling the distance in which normal conversations take place reduces the speech signal received by the listener even more.

The result is you may have more problems than usual understanding conversations with friends and family, but even more important, this may be an issue to recognize when visiting health care providers or others who are trying to provide personal counsel, such as an attorney or financial advisor.

#### How can we accommodate

for the combination of masking and social distancing as the "new normal" in our daily routines, and yet hear the important information others are trying to convey? Here are a few important tips:

- > Stand 6 feet apart, but face the other individual when talking.
- > Consider wearing an approved clear face mask to maximize lip/facial cues. There are clear face masks now available on the market, and that we have for sale. These can be very helpful.
- > Speak slowly and clearly.
- > Rephrase rather than just repeat what was not heard.
- > Minimize environmental noises like the air conditioner, fans, etc. These sounds can drown out or muffle speech even more.
- > Be prepared to write answers down to the questions the listener has. This helps minimize communication errors.
- > If you wear hearing aids, ask your audiologist about options to help overcome the "mask" situation.
  Adjustments may help address the "muffled" effect the mask has on speech, and may help make it easier to hear.
- > If you wear behind-the-ear hearing aids, be careful when removing the elastic straps on the mask so that they don't pull your hearing aids off by accident.

In addition to adjusting your hearing devices for a mask situation, consider talking with an audiologist about a spouse mic/remote mic or FM system that streams the conversation partner's voice directly to the wearer's hearing aids.

The conversation partner simply clips a discreet remote mic onto their clothing, or places it on a table. The individual with hearing loss may or may not need to wear a wireless Bluetooth accessory around their neck, depending upon their hearing aid model. The mic has a 20 to 30-foot range and the mic and receiver work best when they are within sight of one another. It is especially helpful in one-on-one conversations in difficult listening environments, like when wearing masks.

If you are struggling with communicating with others when they are wearing a mask or are stressed by hearing loss, talk with your audiologist.

#### **Buyer Beware!**

Recently, the Kansas Insurance Commissioner issued a warning to consumers that there has been an uptick in the number of complaints due to scams. Here are some to watch out for:

> "Coronavirus Insurance" is not real. It does not



exist. Anyone trying to sell it is trying to scam you.

- > Beware of phone calls where people claim to be from your insurance company. They may even have some of your information. Don't change your policy during these phone calls. Hang up and call your agent.
- > NEVER give out any personal information (Medicare number, Social Security number, credit card number, etc.) to anyone over the phone.

# 5 Ways to Save on Hearing Aids Now

Hearing aids are a significant investment in your health, and one that can be vitally important. But, actually paying for hearing aids can sometimes be more difficult. So let's take a look at some ways you can pay for hearing aids now, AND save money.

> Pay cash if you can. If you can't, Associated Audiologists accepts a variety of credit cards. If you have a flexible spending account(FSA) or health saving plan (HSA), hearing aids qualify as an expense. In 2020, FSAs are limited to \$2,750 per year per employee. If you're married, your spouse also can put up to \$2,750 in an FSA with their employer. HSAs don't usually have limits but sometimes the credit card associated with an HSA has a daily maximum use cap.

> In most cases. you must use the dollars you've saved in your FSA by the end of the calendar year. In many cases, if you don't use those dollars, you lose them. An HSA doesn't lose the dollars you've saved and rather acts like a savings account used only for health related expenses.

> Use your insurance benefits. Insurance coverage for hearing examinations and hearing aids varies from one insurance provider to the next, even from plan to plan under the same insurance company. Check with the clinic where we see you to verify your benefits and explain your options.

Save on your 2020 taxes. Hearing aids are a qualified medical expense if you itemize your medical expenses on your income taxes. Be sure to talk with your tax advisor regarding claiming medical expenses. Additionally, if you purchase hearing aids through Associated Audiologists, they qualify as medical devices and are exempt from sales tax, which may not be the case if you purchase hearing aids through retail outlets.

Check financing options. CareCredit is a convenient, monthly payment program we use at Associated Audiologists. The Wells Fargo Financial National Bank credit card program also provides budget flexibility through a comprehensive range of financing options. These plans usually have a set time frame for repayment which can influence the interest rate you are assessed.

Our staff has the expertise to check and verify your insurance coverage, as well as provide detailed estimates of hearing aid recommendations and costs. We also can provide you with the receipts necessary for reimbursement from your FSA or HSA plan.
